## Graduation for Class of 2017 Caps School Year

The 2016-17 school year was capped off with the graduation of the Lancer class of 2017. While small in number, the class had some memorable successes.

"Given the size of this class, it is interesting all they accomplished," noted Cliff Bonner, FH Middle and High School Principal. "While the class numbered only 56 students, they collected almost half a million dollars in college scholarships and many walked off the stage straight into jobs that they had found while doing their internships."

Members of this class will be pursuing a wide range of interests and careers in their post-high school days. In addition to joining the Army and taking their places in the work force, graduates will be headed to a wide range of universities majoring in everything from Digital Animation to World Religions, Culinary Arts to Law Enforcement.

Bonner also noted that members of the class had art work recognized in the Governor's state art show, were selected as state

interns in the Business Professionals of America program, and were recruited into the Marching 110 at Ohio University. "Once again our students are off to make a difference in the world."

They made a difference while they were in our halls as well. "A small class, they knew each other well. And when tragedy struck, as it did with members of the class losing their lives, facing horrible diseases, or losing their homes, every one of these kids stepped in

to help one another," noted Guidance Counselor Amy Buchman. "I think Cliff best summed them up in his graduation speech when he said they were both resilient and resolved as a class."

Now that these graduates have departed, we look back on the 2016-17

school year and ask ourselves how we did on the goals the district set for itself. In the following pages you will find our annual Report to the Community, focused on Academic Achievement, Student Involvement, Buildings and Grounds, and Finances. You will also meet our new teachers for the coming year and read about some big plans for the future of your school district.

# Report to Our Community

We are pleased to send all residents of our Federal Hocking community this 'local report card' on your schools. While the State of Ohio sends out such a report, it only includes student scores on state tests. But when we asked families and community members what they wanted to know about our schools we found out you wanted a broader picture of how we are doing.

From academics and athletics, to new facilities for our students, we've summarized the year and talk about plans to come.

## Report on Academic Achievement

Over the past several years the Federal Hocking district has been developing tools consistent across grade levels and schools to track student progress. Of particular importance to us has been student progress in reading, progress to graduation, and graduation rates. We also track student attendance, because we know it is hard to do well at school if you do not attend regularly. We believe these are the best indicators available to track student success both in school and in life after school.

In addition to local measures, we also receive a state report card that provides us with how our children scored on the state achievement tests. We use both sources of information to identify areas of academic strength and challenge, altering our programs to better meet any areas of weakness.

### Reading Levels

Our district uses a 'leveled' reader approach. Children are assessed throughout the year as to their progress in reading and instruction is geared to that progress.

- 53% of our elementary school children were reading at or above their expected grade level last year. Our target was 75% and we fell short of that. We are again setting a target of 75% of our elementary students being at or above their expected grade level at the end of the 2017-18 school year.
- In order to assist with improving reading skills, the district has created three 'reading specialist' positions to provide extra support to struggling readers, one in each elementary school and one at the middle school.

### Attendance Rate

Our attendance rate stayed high again this year, with one of the best rates in the region. We appreciate all the families that work hard to have their children come to school every day!

- Elementary School Attendance: 93.5%
- Middle School Attendance: 94.9%
- High School Attendance: 95.7%

### Progress to Graduation

While it is necessary to hold students back at times, one of the best predictors of making it to graduation is progressing through each grade on time. We have a very high 'progress to graduation' rate, which probably also explains our high graduation rates.

- 98% of our elementary students advanced to the next grade on time.
- 100% of our middle and high school students advanced to the next grade on time.

### Graduation Rate

We believe that the best measure of our school system's success is our graduation rate. We continue to have a high graduation rate and we far exceed the graduation rate for the state of Ohio of 82%. Rates for the past years are as follows (the state does not release a graduation rate for the Class of 2017 until next spring). Our target will always be a 100% graduation rate.

- Class of 2015 Graduation Rate: 91%
- Class of 2016 Graduation Rate: 91.4%

### State Achievement Tests

We were disappointed by the results in our state achievement tests this year. While these tests are not the best indicator of student success, they do provide one way of looking at student progress.

Given the results of the tests, our schools will be making several changes in the coming year. First, we are re-examining the curriculum at all grade levels to make sure students are being taught the content that is covered in the state standards and the state tests. Second, we have added reading specialist positions in both elementary schools and the middle school to assist with student reading skills that we know can affect testing. Finally, we are investing in new computers and computer programs so that students have experience taking tests on computers similar to the tests they take for the state evaluations.

We believe these steps will improve upon our state testing results. While for the past year we did not meet any of the state passing standards on any test, our goal is to reach 75% of the state standards in the coming year and 90% in 2018-19.

### New Programs Planned for 2017-18

- ✓ All students in grades 9 through 12 will be issued Chromebook computers to use at school and to take home with them so they can use them outside of school.
- ✓ Reading specialists have been put in place at Coolville and Amesville Elementary and the Middle School in order to enhance reading instruction.
- ✓ A third kindergarten classroom has been put in place at both elementary schools in order to lower class sizes for our youngest learners.

# Report on Student Involvement

## Studies show that when kids are involved in

extracurricular activities and sports they are more likely to succeed in school. We also know that children who are involved in these activities do better in college and in jobs than those who are not.

Last year our Report to the Community shared baseline information on how many of our students are in activities and our goal of moving to 100% student involvement. In order to meet this goal we added several new sports and activities for students and saw student participation climb at all schools.

## Sports and Clubs

It was our goal to grow the activity programs for FH students during the 2016-17 school year—and we did it!

New sports teams were added at the middle and high school: Archery, Sport Shooting, and we welcome the return of our Wrestling program.

With the help of some great parent volunteers, the elementary schools expanded the Biddy League Basketball and Cheerleading programs to include children in our youngest grades.

## Art and Music

We continue to support art and music with full-time teachers in these areas in all of our buildings. The range of opportunities for children include drama, marching band, concert band, elementary band, choir, and clubs that focus on the arts including art club and drama club.

- 100% of our elementary students have art and music as part of their academic program with full-time art and music teachers in both elementary schools.
- 43% of our middle and high school students took art or music during the past school year.
- 27% of our 5th and 6th graders participated in band.

Lancers make a big difference in the life of our communities.



Clubs for the arts and academics were made available. After School Choir and Destination Imagination were added at the elementary level, while the middle and high school now have the Math Club and Science Olympiad, where students compete in 'events' pertaining to biology, chemistry, physics and engineering.

- 100% of our children in elementary school have physical education as part of their academic schedule and we have full-time PE teachers in both elementary schools.
- 35% of our elementary students participated in one or more of the community sponsored athletic teams in our community.
- 78% of our middle and high school students were involved in one or more club or sporting team!







### Community Service

When we surveyed our community, one of the things that parents said they valued was having their children involved in community service. We agree! By engaging in community service activities students not only learn skills such as speaking, listening, and cooperation, they also see how they can make a difference in the world.

During the 2016-17 school year students from Federal Hocking made a big difference in the life of our communities:

- Provided Christmas for over 100 children through the Angel Tree project.
- Raised and donated over \$3,000 and hundreds of pounds of food for area food banks through a variety of projects at all grade levels.
- Cleaned and built parks, spruced up neighborhoods, engaged with senior citizens and more through the Middle and High School Day of Service.
- Visited nursing homes where they provided table decorations and entertained residents with their musical talents.
- Through fund raisers such as Pennies for Patients, Jump Rope for Heart Health, and Empty Bowls for Food Banks raised and donated nearly \$10,000 from our elementary schools.
- Helped shelve library books, provided peer mediation and tutoring help, coached Special Olympics teams and more!

**While it is difficult to compute, it looks like over 10,000 hours of community service activities were undertaken by Federal Hocking students and staff.**

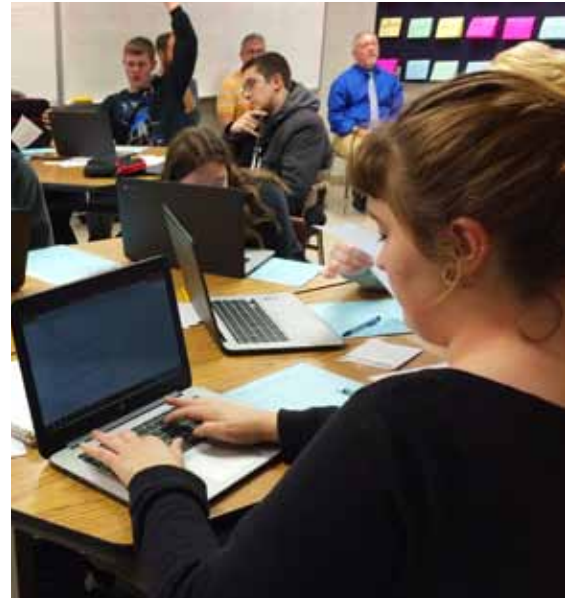

# Report on Buildings, Grounds & Transportation

## Facilities

Federal Hocking School District is continuing to carry out a multiple year plan to upgrade and enhance all of our facilities as well as our bus fleet.

Last year and over the summer a number of upgrades were completed or undertaken that we believe will enhance the learning opportunities for all children.

- Construction of a new storage building at Amesville.
- Replacing carpet with tile in classrooms at Coolville.
- The purchase of two new school buses.

## Technology

The purchase of over 700 new Chromebook computers deployed to students in all grades. At the high school juniors and seniors were issued their own Chromebook to use both at school and at home. This program will be expanded in 2017-18 to include all high school students.

The installation of a new WiFi system that allows all computers in the district to operate without a corded connection.

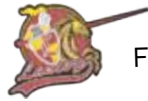
The development of a new student information system that will allow us to better track student progress.

- ✓ The Lancer Care Clinic opened in the Middle School building that provides medical services to all members of our community. Additionally, when medical needs arise for students at our schools there will be full-time medical professionals available to provide assistance!
- ✓ The Danny and Pat Hall Field House is under construction and will soon be providing locker and training facilities for our athletes at the high school. The facility will be used by all Lancer athletes and will provide a large workout facility that teams have been lacking in the past.

# Report on District Finances

Despite the fact that the Ohio Legislature has done little to raise support for public schools, your district's finances remain healthy. This past year we were able to give all employees a 3% raise as well as set aside funds for building projects, technology, and athletics.

Over the year we were able to use reserve funds to upgrade technology and facilities while still ending the year with a \$530,000 budget surplus. Our careful use of funds has allowed us to add six teaching positions and an additional cook at the middle and high school for 2017-18.

The pie charts below illustrate where our funds come from and how they are spent, both last year and our projections into the future.

## Permanent Improvement Funds

Annually nearly \$600,000 in local tax dollars goes into a **Permanent Improvement (PI) Fund**. This fund is set aside to purchase items that have a life

of more than five years including things like school buses, textbooks, computers, classroom materials, etc. Additionally, we have a reserve fund within the PI Fund so that if an emergency arises we can cover it. Currently we have \$200,000 in this reserve fund.

## Holding Funds in Reserve

In order to plan for the future, the Federal Hocking School Board has created a variety of special and reserve funds. These funds allow us to protect the district from an unforeseen expense and provide resources to our schools on a regular basis. Here is a list of those funds:

### Capital Improvement Reserve Fund:

An annual allocation of \$200,000 with a planned expenditure of \$1,100,000 in 2018 to replace the middle school roof.

**Budget Reserve:** This \$500,000 fund is under the control of the School Board and may only be used with Board approval for unexpected expenses or short falls.

**Technology Fund:** This will be the third year for our \$500,000 Technology Fund which has paid for new computers and devices as well as the new WiFi technology. This year additional expenditures will include digital projectors and screens in all schools.

**Permanent Improvement Reserve:** We set aside \$20,000 annually for projects such as the new storage buildings.

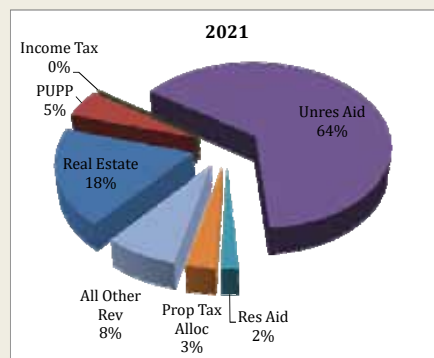
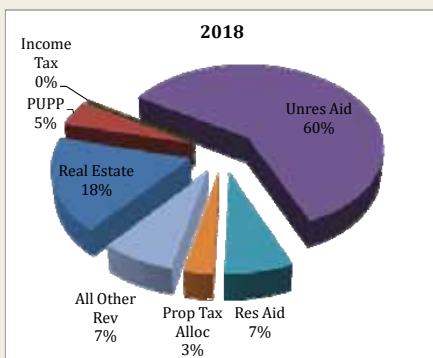
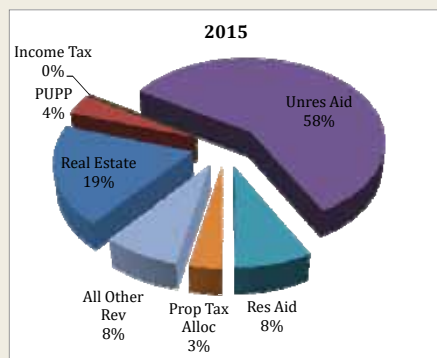
**Athletic Fund:** New this year will be an Athletic Fund with an initial investment of \$50,000 and annual investments of \$20,000 to purchase large scale athletic equipment (such as wrestling mats) and to improve locker rooms and personal equipment.

**Professional Development Fund:** An annual allocation of \$35,000 that is divided between the schools to be used by the principal in providing professional development for staff.

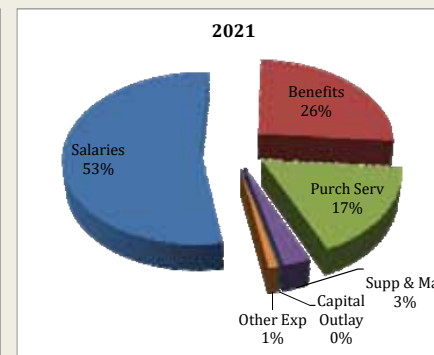
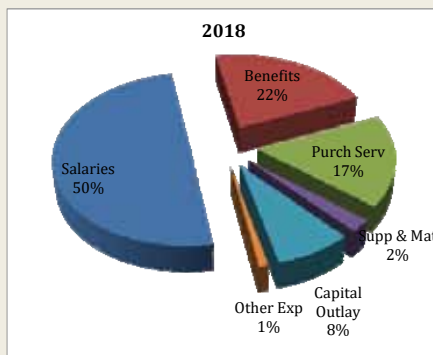
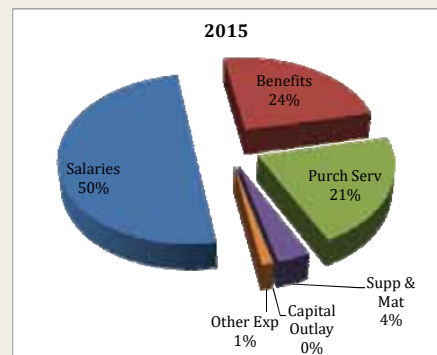
### Operating Revenue Summary

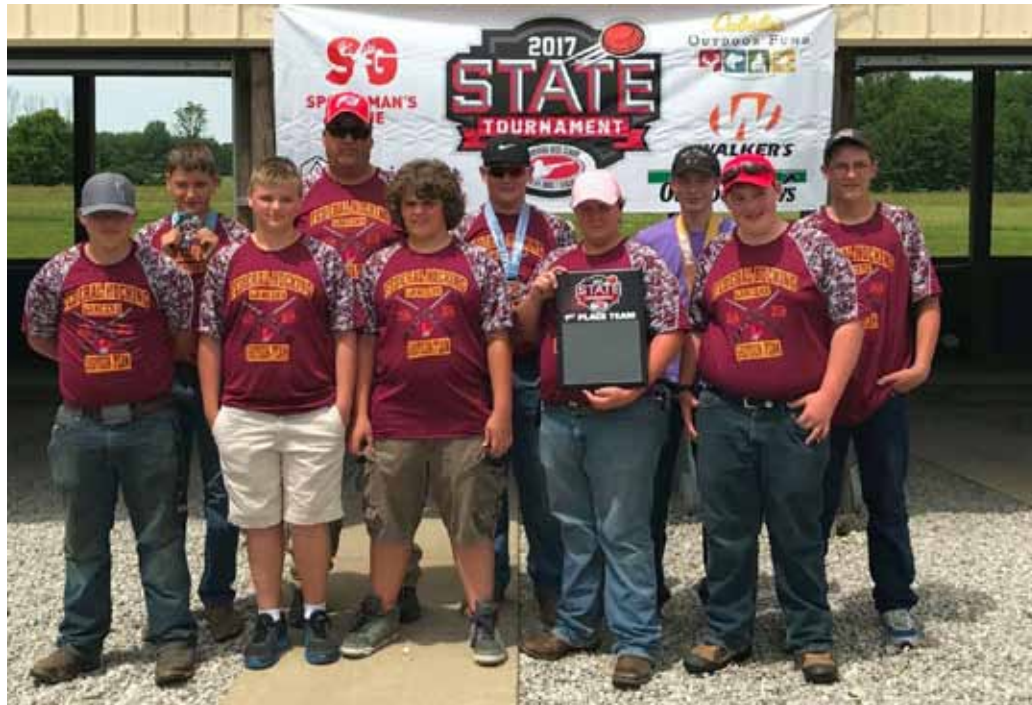


# FH SPORT SHOOTING TEAM IS STATE CHAMPION!

The all-rookie team claimed the first team state championship in school history!

The Ohio State High School Clay Target League Championship is a competition in trap shooting—a 100 target contest where the scores of each team's top five shooters combine for a team score. Lancer marksmen scored a total of 436, besting second place finisher Alexander by 9 targets and third place finisher North Ridge High School by 18.

Scott Pfeiffer, FH Agricultural Science teacher, started and coached the team and was joined by Superintendent George Wood as an assistant coach. The biggest challenge, according to Pfeiffer, was getting kids to practice in Albany where the county's only trap shooting facility is located. "We really appreciate the Hocking Valley Sportsmen's Club letting us use their facilities for practice."



Great things lie ahead for the team, as most of its members are middle school students. "We hope to see more students participate in year two, boys and girls," noted Pfeiffer.
